

Yunnan Baiyao for Dogs

An Owner's Guide to Bleeding Support & Safer Home Use

What you'll get: a clear, vet-first guide for when to treat bleeding as an emergency, how to use products safely at home, how to dose by weight, and what to monitor.

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Safety Snapshot

Emergency - go now

- Collapse, extreme weakness, or trouble standing
- Pale/white gums
- Heavy bleeding that will not slow
- Suspected internal bleeding (bloated abdomen, black/tarry stool)

Call your vet today

- Repeated nosebleeds
- Bleeding mass/tumor
- Unusual bruising or bleeding from gums
- Any bleeding plus medications (chemo/anticoagulants) - call your vet

If you're ever unsure, choose the safer option: call your veterinarian.

Emergency Decision Page

If your dog is weak, pale, collapsing, or bleeding heavily, treat it as an emergency and seek urgent veterinary care.

Go to an emergency veterinarian now if you see any of the following:

- Collapse or inability to stand
- Extreme weakness, confusion, or rapid breathing
- Pale/white gums
- Heavy bleeding that will not slow
- Possible internal bleeding: sudden weakness, bloated abdomen, black/tarry stool

Call your veterinarian today (do not wait) if:

- Nosebleeds that are repeated or worsening
- A bleeding mass or tumor (including nasal tumors)
- New or unexplained bruising
- Bleeding plus prescription medications (especially chemotherapy or anticoagulants)

Why this matters: Bleeding can be external or internal. Internal bleeding can worsen quickly and is not safe to manage at home.

Call the vet - what to say (30 seconds)

"My dog is bleeding from ___ (nose / wound / mass)."

"Gum color is ___; energy is ___."

"Started at ___; frequency is ___."

"Current meds: ___."

What It Is / What It's Not

Yunnan Baiyao is a traditional herbal formula commonly discussed as supportive care for bleeding control in dogs under veterinary guidance.

What it is

Most owners and veterinarians consider Yunnan Baiyao an add-on support tool: it may help stabilize certain bleeding situations while your dog receives appropriate veterinary care.

What it is not

- Not a substitute for diagnosis, treatment, or emergency care
- Not a guarantee of outcomes (results vary by condition and individual)
- Not a reason to delay urgent care when bleeding is severe or your dog looks unwell

If you are unsure whether your dog's bleeding is serious, choose the safer option: contact your veterinarian or emergency clinic.

Do / Don't (quick boundary)

Do: use as part of a vet-aware plan.

Do: track changes daily.

Don't: delay urgent care if your dog is weak/pale or bleeding heavily.

When Owners Commonly Consider It

Most owners consider Yunnan Baiyao for bleeding support in specific scenarios, but veterinary input matters most when underlying disease or medications are involved.

Common scenarios

- Tumor-related bleeding (for example, nasal bleeding or fragile masses)
- Minor-to-moderate external bleeding (small cuts, nail quick bleeding)
- Post-procedure support (only when your veterinarian recommends it)
- Unexpected bleeding episodes when you need a clear plan

Talk to your vet first if your dog:

- Is taking prescription medications (especially chemotherapy or anticoagulants)
- Has liver or kidney disease
- Is very old, very small, or has multiple medical conditions
- Has repeated unexplained bleeding

Red flags that change the plan

Stop "watching at home" and call a vet if you see:

- pale/white gums
- collapse/marked weakness
- rapid breathing
- bleeding that won't slow

How to Use (Oral) + Red Capsule Rule

Use oral forms with food, follow a plan, and treat any emergency red capsule as vet-directed support only.

Oral basics (owner-friendly)

- Give with food if your dog has a sensitive stomach.
- If using capsules: give directly or hide in a small treat. If allowed by your vet and the product label, you may open the capsule and mix contents into wet food.
- If using powder: mix into a small portion of food first so your dog consumes the full amount.

Emergency Red Capsule (if included)

Use only for emergencies and only with veterinary direction. It is not intended for routine daily use.

Schedule overview

Many veterinarians prefer cycling schedules (alternating days or 5 days on / 5 days off) with reassessment.

Feeding tips (to reduce missed doses)

- Use a **small** treat portion first; confirm your dog eats it fully.
- Powder: mix into a **small** amount of wet food, then finish the meal.
- If vomiting or diarrhea persists, **stop and call your vet**.

How to Use (Topical): Practical Home Steps

Topical use should be simple and label-guided - deep wounds or uncontrolled bleeding need veterinary care.

Checklist

- Clean gently
- Check depth (puncture/bite = vet first)
- Use label-appropriate topical form
- Recheck regularly; keep bandage clean & dry

Vet-first wound types: bite wounds and punctures can trap bacteria under the skin. Do not self-treat - see a veterinarian.

Do not

- Do not apply products to open wounds when the label warns against it.
- Do not treat deep punctures, bite wounds, or large lacerations at home.
- Do not ignore worsening swelling, pain, odor, or discharge - these can signal infection.

Dosing Guide (By Weight) + Schedule

Use the weight-based dosing rule and a cycling schedule, and reassess with your veterinarian.

Dog Weight	Capsules	Powder
Under 10 lb	1 capsule once daily	25 mg once daily
10-30 lb	1 capsule twice daily	25 mg twice daily
31-60 lb	2 capsules twice daily	50 mg twice daily
Over 60 lb	2 capsules three times daily	50 mg three times daily

Note: powder amounts apply only to powder products. Follow the label for your exact product.

Suggested schedule (commonly used)

- Alternating days, OR
- 5 days on / 5 days off (repeat as needed)

Best-practice principle: many veterinarians prefer the lowest effective amount and regular reassessment.

How to choose a schedule (ask your vet)

- If bleeding is **intermittent**, many vets use **cycling** (alt days or 5 on/5 off).
- If bleeding risk is **high**, follow your vet's plan and reassess sooner.

Monitoring + Owner Log

Daily tracking helps you notice changes early and communicate clearly with your vet.

Track these daily

- Bleeding amount and frequency
- Energy and appetite
- Gum color (pink vs pale/white)
- Stool (especially black/tarry stool)
- Thirst and urination changes

Example row (how to write it)

Jan 10 | mild nosebleed x1 | normal appetite | gums pink | stool normal | call vet if repeats

Simple log (print or screenshot)

Date	Bleeding	Energy	Gums	Stool	Notes

Troubleshooting: What to Do If...

If symptoms worsen or new concerning signs appear, stop and contact your veterinarian promptly.

Stop and call your vet (or emergency clinic) if:

- Bleeding worsens or returns more frequently
- Persistent diarrhea or vomiting
- Marked lethargy, weakness, or pale gums
- Any allergic signs (facial swelling, hives, intense itching)

If changes are mild (and your dog is stable):

- Continue to monitor closely and record observations in your log.
- Contact your veterinarian if symptoms last longer than 24 hours or your dog seems uncomfortable.

Reminder: This guide does not replace veterinary care. When in doubt, call your veterinarian.

STOP & call vet

heavy/worsening bleeding,
pale gums, collapse, allergic
signs.

WATCH closely

mild GI upset < 24h, stable
energy, bleeding improving.

OK to continue

stable, bleeding controlled,
normal appetite/energy - per
vet plan.

Evidence Snapshot + Questions to Ask Your Vet

Evidence is supportive but not definitive - your veterinarian helps translate it into a safe plan for your dog.

Evidence snapshot (plain English)

Research on Yunnan Baiyao in dogs includes clotting-related measurements in healthy dogs, laboratory studies in canine cancer cell lines, and individual case reports. These findings suggest Yunnan Baiyao may support bleeding control in certain situations, but results vary and are not guaranteed.

What this means for owners: Use Yunnan Baiyao only as part of a vet-aware plan. If bleeding is heavy or your dog is weak or pale, prioritize urgent care. Track changes daily and reassess with your vet.

Questions to ask your vet (bring this page to your appointment)

- Is the bleeding likely external, nasal/oral, or could it be internal?
- What are the emergency warning signs for my dog (gums, weakness, breathing, collapse)?
- Could Yunnan Baiyao interact with my dog's current medications (especially chemotherapy or anticoagulants)?
- Which schedule do you recommend (alternating days vs cycling), and for how long before reassessment?
- What should I track daily, and when should I stop and call you?
